- In response to the global (UN) Food Systems Summit process,
  Malawi has commenced the process by constituting a high-level multi-stakeholder taskforce that is organizing the national (and sub-national) stakeholders' dialogue.
- It is pleasing to note that this 6<sup>th</sup> ESS event will discuss human and institutional capacity as they relate to building resilient agri-food systems at national and continental level. This is consistent with the context of the Food Systems Summit Dialogues.

- I would like to thank the coordination of MwAPATA Institute, NPC and LUANAR for organizing this important event which will directly inform the national food systems dialogue.
- The Ministry of Agriculture is committed to making sure that the outcomes from this this Eminent Speaker Series informs the Malawi position to the 2021 UN Food System Summit.
